

The FMF Warfare Pin Challenge

Qualifying for the FMF Warfare pin is no different from any endeavor wherein one is expected to make personal sacrifices in order to achieve the objective. Complying with the CG's mandate that all 1FSSG personnel will be qualified within six months upon reporting to the command is undoubtedly not an easy feat considering we have other priorities to contend with. Tough as it may seem though, it's not at all impossible as evidenced by Branch Dental Clinic, Yuma's 100% qualification rate and Dental Battalion's better than average overall qualification rate compared to other battalions in the Group. These impressive statistics were made possible through the concerted efforts of the leaders and members of the command dedicated to meeting the CG's challenge. Furthermore, these numbers are a living testimony of the command's commitment to the Commander's Strategic Priorities involving "operational competence

...tools for success, in garrison, on the battlefield, on-duty, and off-duty”, the very same tools provided by FMF Warfare training.

In order to qualify, the demands are high but the rewards in terms of personal satisfaction and sense of accomplishment are immeasurable. Here are a few pointers to consider when preparing for the FMF qualification:

- Develop the motivation and initiative to qualify for the pin by envisioning yourself wearing it with pride as a result of your hard work.
- Gather as many ideas as possible on what to expect during the oral board by talking to those who have already qualified; board members are not the same and each one has a unique experience.
- Attend all scheduled FMF qualification training sessions; the pool of instructors for these sessions are volunteering their efforts and off duty time. The February weekend training session spearheaded by Chief Cuenca was well attended even by personnel outside Dental Battalion, and a good 95% of those attendees passed their oral boards.
- Study, study, and study. There’s no secret to making it through the board, or any test for that matter, other than hitting those study materials.
- Develop an effective way of absorbing your study materials. Studying with the boom box on may not work for you as well as for others.

- For some, if not most, they have turned the table around and developed a positive attitude to propel themselves to a successful written and oral board. This requirement is something we do not have a choice on; the sooner we get this over with, the sooner we could focus on other priorities. Remember, the FMF Warfare pin may not be a number one priority but still a priority nonetheless.

DEPMED IN THE SPOTLIGHT:
LEGALMAN CONVERSION STORY

I was born in Aden, Yemen Arab Republic. Because of my father’s employment with the United Nations Office. I lived in Goa, India until I was 16 years old. I immigrated to the United States from Goa, India in November of 1979 and lived in Benzonia, Michigan until I enlisted in the U.S. Navy in June of 1981.

I attended boot camp at Recruit Training Command, Orlando, Florida. Upon completion of boot camp in November of 1981, I attended Seaman training school and later reported as a Seaman Recruit to Deck Department on board USS JOHN D. BARRY (DD 933 – Destroyer, now decommissioned), home ported in Newport, Rhode Island. “Encouraged” by my Chief, I took the Boatswains mate test and was accepted into the rating. A year after being on board USS JOHN D. BARRY, she was decommissioned and so I was sent to yet another sea going vessel. In October of 1982, I landed on the USS W. S. SIMS (FF 1059 – a Fast Frigate), home ported in Mayport, Florida, where I gained additional Boatswain’s Mate experience and was advanced to BM3. In September of 1985, I reenlisted under the Guaranteed Assignment Three (GUARD III) program – free ticket to the West Coast and landed in San Diego, California – Golden State. I was stationed on board USS AJAX (AR-6 – Destroyer Tender), home ported in San Diego until she was decommissioned in December of 1986.

While I was stationed on board USS AJAX, I was promoted to Boatswain’s Mate Second Class Petty Officer.

On 11 July 1986 I very proudly became a United States Citizen. In January 1987, I reported to my first shore command, HSL-33 (Helicopter Squadron), Naval Air Station, North Island, where I served as Leading Petty Officer of the First Lieutenant Division.

My career dream had always been to perform administrative and legal duties. In order to pursue this dream, I decided to work on my application for conversion into the Legalman rating.

It was in January of 1990 when my boss, LT Abby Hogan, heard through the grapevine, that I was in interested in converting to the legalman rating. Without any hesitation, LT Hogan took me under her wing and provided me an opportunity to acquire all the administrative skills I needed to be accepted into the legalman rating. I was determined to successfully apply for conversion to the legalman rating at all costs.

In two months time, I was able to master all the administrative skills I needed. LT Hogan was pleased with my progress and arranged for me to be interviewed by a reputable Senior Judge Advocate General Corps (JAG) officer, Captain Reynolds, that went well. Upon completion of all my requirements, LT Hogan sent off my application, along with Commanding Officer’s strong recommendation for conversion to Legalman, to the Bureau of Naval Personnel.

In April of 1990, I was very excited to learn that I was approved for conversion to the legalman rating. Soon after I received

this approval, I attended Naval Justice School at Newport, Rhode Island, from April 1990 to June 1990. Upon successful graduation from Naval Justice School, I returned to sea duty aboard USS INDEPENDENCE (CV 62) for my first tour as a legalman. Eager to commence my new career in the legal field. I gained a vast amount of experience on USS INDEPENDENCE, three years later I transferred to Naval Legal Service Office Southwest where I gained even more valuable legal experience. In October 1996, I transferred to Commander Carrier Group 7, Naval Air Station, North Island where I completed an eventful deployment to the Arabian Gulf on board USS NIMITZ (CVN 68) at the time of heightened tensions with Iraq. While assigned to this command, I learned things that I had never learned before - Operational Law. Upon completion of this tour of duty, I was extremely lucky to achieve yet another dream – duty assignment close to home – Temecula. I was very fortunate to negotiate PCS orders to my current duty station – Naval Dental Center.

I thank my Guardian Angel, LT Abby Hogan, for helping me tremendously with my application for conversion to legalman, without her assistance, encouragement, and support, I would have never made it in the legalman rating. I also owe a great deal of gratitude to all the administrative personnel who helped me achieve my dream. I will be forever grateful to LT Abby Hogan who had complete faith in me and provided me with all the guidance and tools I needed to be successful in achieving my career dream.

LT Abby Hogan’s unselfish guidance, my personal determination, hard work, perseverance and a great deal of luck helped me enter into the legalman rating. I feel extremely fortunate and honored to be in

this rating. I find this job very rewarding, satisfying, challenging, interesting, and exciting. I would never trade any other job for this one. So, I am keeping it until I retire next year.

This is my story and I am sticking to it.

DENTAL TECHNICIAN “C” SCHOOLS

The Dental Technician Rating currently has 7 “C” Schools available to personnel who qualify. These include Basic Prosthetic, Advance Prosthetic, Surgical Technologist, Equipment Repair, Administrative, Hygiene and Maxillofacial. There are a few prerequisites common to all “C” Schools. 1) First term personnel must complete at least 18 months aboard current command, all others must complete at least 24 months. 2) No NJP, court martial or civil court action in the past 3 years. 3) Obligation of service for 36 months or more (depending on school). 4) Completion of DT Basic or DT Volume 1 and 2. 5) Depending on the “C” School, there will be a minimum time in rating, minimum recommended striking period and minimum/maximum rank and active duty years. For detailed information contact your perspective Retention Team Members (below) or the Command Career Counselor.

Remember, the DT rating is currently overmanned, and advancement is highly competitive. You may, in that case, consider cross-rating to an undermanned rating. The benefits of switching to another rating may include: additional education and training opportunities, greater advancement opportunity, and a chance to work in a field more suited to your abilities or personal interests. MILPERSMAN 1440-010 is the reference for Rating Conversion (Cross-rating). Current manning levels for all Navy Ratings may be found in the latest CREO/REGA message. Contact your Retention Team Members or Command Career Counselor for additional information.

American Red Cross Dental Assistant Volunteers

They do!

14 June 2002 marked another momentous day in the history of 1st Dental Battalion / Naval Dental Center Camp Pendleton; eight talented American Red Cross Dental Assistant Volunteers graduated from the command sponsored training program. CDR Dembinski, DT1 Cain and DT2 White directed this comprehensive 40-hour training program.

During this week of challenge and fun the volunteers were instructed by many of the command’s providers and technicians. Their course of study included, infection

control, basic anatomy and dental anatomy, chair-side dental assisting, oral hygiene instruction training, dental record entries, dental materials, CSR protocol, customer service and an orientation to each of the different dental specialties. One morning of the week was spent in a clinic where they were introduced to the different aspects of the dental operatory.

The volunteers had several criteria that had to be met before they were accepted into the program. They had to have a current CPR Card and Basic First Aid certificate. This training was obtained through the local chapter of the American Red Cross. They had to prove that they have had Hepatitis B vaccination. If they had not had Hepatitis B vaccination, it would be provided by the Navy. They must have attended an interview conducted by the command’s program director and assistants. During the interview, the volunteer was queried about past experience in the medical field (not required, but beneficial), knowledge of course requirements, transportation obligations and childcare concerns. Certain grooming standards and professional demeanor were explained.

After graduation, the volunteers were assigned to various clinics within the command. In return for training, the volunteers agreed to volunteer for at least 400-hours in the clinic. In the past, many of the volunteers have so enjoyed working in the clinics that once they reached their 400-hours, they continued to volunteer for hundreds of more hours. The volunteers’ contributions have been of great benefit to the command. The obvious monetary benefits have equated to thousands of dollars per volunteer. In addition, they have allowed many of the military dental technicians freedom to perform their many

collateral duties and attend additional training as needed.

After completion of the 400-hours of clinical service, the volunteer will receive a Certificate of Training from the Red Cross. With this certificate, many of the volunteers will seek civilian employment. In the past, volunteers have been hired by the Contract Dental Assistant Program. However, many of the Red Cross Volunteers go on the better than average paying positions in the civilian community. Often times, civilian dentists will call the program director seeking a dental assistant. The outstanding reputation and the high quality of training that the volunteers receive are well known in the community.

The next American Red Cross Dental Assistant Volunteer Training Class is tentatively scheduled for the week of 04 November 2002. If you or anyone else you know is interested in attending this free training program, contact DT2 White at 13 Area Dental Clinic for more information.
